

From the Pastor . . .

A New Philosophy

As we start a new Church Year with the beginning of Advent, I am changing my philosophy about the hymns we sing in the

Divine Service . . . just a little!

Ever since I came to Saint Athanasius, I have striven to use a great variety of the hymns in our hymnal. I want you to be familiar with the rich and varied hymnody that is available to us. To accomplish this, it has been my practice to try not to sing any one hymn more than twice a year. That way, we get to sing a greater variety of hymns. The exceptions to this have been the Lord's Supper hymns we sing during the distribution of the Sacrament.

But part of the tradition of the Lutheran Church is also the recognition that there are some hymns worth singing more often (*kernlieder*), so that you get to know them better and even commit them to memory. I was discussing this recently with our Board for Evangelism and Outreach, and we decided this would be a good practice to start in our church. So I am changing my philosophy . . . *just a little!* We will now sing some hymns more often.

So, which hymns, you may be wondering? For this year, it will be Luther's catechetical hymns. We'll sing these six hymns in rotation as one of the distribution hymns each week (with a few possible exceptions). Over time, you'll get to know these hymns well as they imprint upon your heart and mind, which is what catechesis is all about.

So watch for these hymns to start appearing with the beginning of Advent. And I hope this new practice is a blessing for you.

Friday, January 24th

From St. Athanasius . . .

(St. Athanasius speaks of the order of creation as testament to the existence of one true God.)

Since then, there is everywhere not disorder but order, proportion and not disproportion, not disarray but arrangement, and that in an order perfectly

harmonious, we needs must infer and be led to perceive the Master that put together and compacted all things, and produced harmony in them . . . to perceive their Ruler, Arranger, and King.

For in like manner as if we saw a city, consisting of many and diverse people, great and small, rich and poor, old and young, male and female, in an orderly condition, and its inhabitants, while different from one another, yet at unity among themselves, and not the rich set against the poor, the great against the small, nor the young against the old, but all at peace in the enjoyment of equal rights, — if we saw this, the inference surely follows that the presence of a ruler enforces concord, even if we do not see him; . . . so in the order and harmony of the Universe, we needs must perceive God the governor of it all, and that He is one and not many.

On the Catechism . . .



During the Advent season we hear of John the Baptist and his proclamation of preparation and repentance. Therefore during this season, a catechism focus on the Ten Commandments is appropriate.

The First Commandment

You shall have no other gods.

What does this mean? We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things.

Let the following point be made to the simple; then they may well note and remember the meaning of this commandment: We are to trust in God alone and look to Him and expect from Him nothing but good, as from one who gives us body, life, food, drink, nourishment, health, protection, peace, and all necessaries of both temporal and eternal things. He also preserves us from misfortune. And if any evil befall us, He delivers and rescues us. So it is God alone (as has been said well enough) from whom we receive all good and by whom we are delivered from all evil. So, I think, we Germans from ancient times name God (more elegantly and appropriately than any other language) from the word Good. It is as though He were an eternal fountain that gushes forth abundantly nothing but what is good. And from that fountain flows forth all that is and is called good.

How to confess from the First Commandment: In what or whom do I trust above all else? In what or whom do I trust most for financial security, physical safety, or emotional support? Do I fear God's wrath, avoiding every sin? Is my love for and trust in God evident in my daily living? Do I expect only good from God in every situation, or do I worry, doubt, complain, and feel unfairly treated when things go wrong?

Preparing for the Divine Service

Holy Gospel: Luke 19:28–40 (Jesus' entry into Jerusalem.) Office Hymn: LSB #332 "Savior of the Nations, Come"

Advent 2 (December 8):

Holy Gospel: Luke 3:1–20 (How do you prepare for Jesus?) Office Hymn: LSB #344 "On Jordan's Bank the Baptist's Cry"

Advent 3 (December 15):

Holy Gospel: Luke 7:18–35 (Is Jesus the one?)

Office Hymn: LSB #345 "Hark! A Thrilling Voice Is Sounding"

Advent 4 (December 22):

Holy Gospel: Luke 1:39–56 (Mary rejoices in the Lord.) Office Hymn: LSB #357 "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel"

Christmas 1 (December 29):

Holy Gospel: Luke 2:22–40 (How to depart in peace.) Office Hymn: LSB #360 "All My Heart Again Rejoices"

The Epiphany of our Lord (January 5):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 2:1-12 (The visit of the Magi.)

Office Hymn: LSB #395 "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright"

The Baptism of our Lord (January 12)

Holy Gospel: Luke 3:15–22 (John baptizes Jesus into His death.) Office Hymn: LSB #407 "To Jordan Came the Christ, Our Lord"

Epiphany 2 (January 19)

Holy Gospel: John 2:1–11 (Jesus loves wedding feasts!) Office Hymn: LSB #408 "Come, Join in Cana's Feast"

St. Titus, Pastor and Confessor / Sanctity of Life Sunday (Jan 26) Holy Gospel: Luke 10:1–9 (Jesus teaches and acts with authority.)

Office Hymn: LSB #585 "Lord Jesus Christ, with Us Abide"

Note: The Liturgy for all these Sundays is **Divine Service 3** (p. 184ff).
