

From the Pastor . . . This Joyful Eastertide

This joyful Eastertide
Away with sin and sorrow!
My love, the Crucified,
Has sprung to life this morrow;
Had Christ, who once was slain,
Not burst His three-day prison,
Our faith had been in vain:
But now has Christ arisen, arisen, arisen;
But now has Christ arisen! (LSB #482 v. 1)

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

You'll probably get this newsletter before we get to proclaim those words in church on Easter. That's okay. As you read these words, look forward to that day and the great joy that is ours on Easter. It is a festival unlike any other.

And as the hymn I included above says, *This Joyful Eastertide*. The great high feast of Easter is one day, but Eastertide is 50! That is, Easter is so great that we cannot just celebrate it one day, but have to celebrate for 50 days. It is the foundation and lynchpin of our faith, as the hymn above states: *Had Christ, who once was slain, not burst His three-day prison, our faith had been in vain*. That's is pretty much a quote from 1 Corinthians 15:14. But Christ has arisen! And therefore, so will we, with Him, to everlasting life. So we sing Easter hymns every Sunday in the Easter season (not *only* Easter hymns, but including Easter hymns), all the way, this year, through May 12. Some may think that strange. That's fine. Let them think that! We will rejoice and continue to rejoice in this great victory of our Saviour.

The Easter season, though, has a rhythm and a pattern to it. Not every Sunday is the same. The **first three Sundays** focus on the risen Jesus and His appearances to His disciples. In these appearances Jesus not only proves to the disciples that He is

really and truly risen and alive bodily, He also teaches them what His resurrection means. He sends them out with the forgiveness of sins that He has also given to them, and He opens their minds to understand how He has fulfilled all the Old Testament so they can go and preach the same thing.

But then on **the Fourth Sunday** of the Easter season we celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday and hear those comforting words that Jesus cares for, tends, and nourishes us as His sheep. And not just now, in this life, for a time - but risen from the dead, He is our forever shepherd! Good news indeed.

And then for **the final three weeks** of the Easter season, our attention turns from looking *back* to what happened on Easter and what it means, to looking *forward* to the promise of the Holy Spirit that Jesus promised He would send to His church after His ascension. This year we will hear of being connected to Jesus as the branches to the vine, and how fed by Christ and with His Spirit we produce the good fruits of faith that mark those who have died and risen with Christ in Holy Baptism. And united to Christ and one flesh with Him, as our heavenly Bridegroom, He will keep us until He comes again in glory, to take home His Bride, the church.

That's a lot to celebrate! *All* that Christ has done for us! So even after you've put away the Easter baskets, all the candy is eaten, and the world has moved on to other things, we'll still be basking in the joy of Easter in church. I hope you all will join us! That our church will be filled with all of you - not just on Easter Sunday - but *every* Sunday of Eastertide.

Alleluia! Now we cry to our King Immortal, Who, triumphant, burst the bars of the tomb's dark portal. Come, you faithful, raise the strain of triumphant gladness! God has brought His Israel into joy from sadness!

From Luther ...

[Luther speaks of what it means to pray the Third Petition of the Lord's Prayer.]

When you pray this petition you must look askance at a gang, which is called the devil and his mates, who would hinder the kingdom of

God. . . . What we pray is: Dear Father, defend us from the devil and his cohorts and from our lazy flesh which would hinder thy will, and grant grace that thy gospel may go forth unhindered. . . . Today we see the whole world raging against the gospel, and even many among us do not have the gospel. Therefore the name of the Father is constantly being profaned. This should move us Christians. When you feel that your own flesh, your slothfulness, avarice, fornication, and passion is hindering you, then say: "Thy will be done!"

From St. Athanasius . . .



[Athanasius speaks of the example of Christ and our rejoicing in His great Easter victory.]

Oh! my brethren, how shall we admire the loving-kindness of the Savior? With what power, and with what a trumpet should a man cry out, exalting these His benefits! That not only should we bear His image, but should receive from Him

an example and pattern of heavenly conversation; that as He hath begun, we should go on, that suffering, we should not threaten, being reviled, we should not revile again, but should bless them that curse, and in everything commit ourselves to God who judgeth righteously. For those who are thus disposed, and fashion themselves according to the Gospel, will be partakers of Christ, and imitators of apostolic conversation, on account of which they shall be deemed worthy of that praise from him . . .



On the Catechism . . .

During the Easter season our Catechism focus is on the Lord's Prayer, for having been buried with Christ through Baptism into death, and then raised to new life with Him, we now call upon "Our Father" for all that we need, "as dear children ask their dear father."

The Third Petition: Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

What does this mean? The good and gracious will of God is done even without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may be done among us also.

How is God's will done? God's will is done when He breaks and hinders every evil plan and purpose of the devil, the world, and our sinful nature, which do not want us to hallow God's name or let His kingdom come; and when He strengthens and keeps us firm in His Word and faith until we die. This is His good and gracious will.

If we would be Christians, therefore, we must surely expect and count on having the devil with all his angels and the world as our enemies [Matthew 25:41; Revelation 12:9]. They will bring every possible misfortune and grief upon us. For where God's Word is preached, accepted, or believed and produces fruit, there the holy cross cannot be missing [Acts 14:22]. And let no one think that he shall have peace [Matthew 10:34]. He must risk whatever he has upon earth—possessions, honor, house and estate, wife and children, body and life. Now, this hurts our flesh and the old Adam [Ephesians 4:22]. The test is to be steadfast and to suffer with patience [James 5:7-8] in whatever way we are assaulted, and to let go whatever is taken from us [1 Peter 2:20-21]. . . . Grant that we may bear with patience and overcome whatever is to be endured because of Your Word and kingdom, so that our poor flesh may not yield or fall away because of weakness or sluggishness.

Easter 2 (April 7):

Holy Gospel: John 20:19–31 (Jesus appears to His disciples.) Office Hymn: LSB #470 "O Sons and Daughters of the King"

Easter 3 (April 14):

Holy Gospel: Luke 24:36–49 (Jesus has fulfilled the Scriptures.) Office Hymn: LSB #483 "With High Delight Let Us Unite"

Easter 4 / Good Shepherd Sunday (April 21):

Holy Gospel: John 10:11–18 (Jesus is the Good Shepherd.) Office Hymn: LSB #709 "The King of Love My Shepherd Is"

Easter 5 (April 28):

Holy Gospel: John 15:1–8 (Jesus is the vine, we the branches.) Office Hymn: LSB #633 "At the Lamb's High Feast We Sing"

Easter 6 (May 5):

Holy Gospel: John 15:9–17 (Abiding in Jesus' love.)

Office Hymn: LSB #556 "Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice"

Easter 7 (May 12):

Holy Gospel: John 17:11b–19 (Jesus unites us to Himself in love.)

Office Hymn: LSB #482 "This Joyful Eastertide"

Feast of Pentecost (May 19):

Holy Gospel: John 15:26–27; 16:4b–15 (Jesus promises the Spirit.) Office Hymn: LSB #497 "Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord"

Festival of the Holy Trinity (May 26):

Holy Gospel: John 3:1–17 (Trinitarian salvation!) Office Hymn: LSB #822 "Alleluia! Let Praises Ring"

Note: The Liturgy for all services in the Easter season and the beginning of the Pentecost season is **Divine Service 1** (p. 151ff).
