



Focus: Youth




Our youth trip to the Higher Things conference *All Things New* in Amherst, MA was great! Good worship, good learning, and good fun. Thank you all for making this trip possible. We are already looking forward to next year's conference in Saint Louis with the theme *Dying Church*, *Rising Hope*.

We also completed our Vacation Bible School *For You*, focusing on our gift giving God and all the gifts He gives to us. As we usually do, we took a special offering each day (Tuesday: pennies, Wednesday: nickels, Thursday: dimes, and Friday: quarters) and the children raised \$275! Pastor promised to match whatever they donated, bringing the total to \$550! The youth decided to support the Lutheran Heritage Foundation's project *Praise Him, Africa*, which will supply Lutheran songbooks in Swahili to children in East Africa. From Luther . . .

(Luther disputes on the certainty of Absolution.)

8. Remission of guilt is based neither on the contrition of the sinner nor on the office or authority of the priest. 9. Rather, it is based on faith, which is directed toward the Word of

Christ, who says, "Whatever you loose . . . ," etc. [Matt 16:19] 10. For it is true that it is not the sacrament of faith, but rather faith in the sacrament, that justifies (that is, not because [the sacrament] is performed, but because it is believed). . . . 15. Therefore, it is certain: sins are remitted if you believe that they are remitted, because the promise of Christ the Savior is certain.

From Athanasius . . .

(Athanasius speaks of the importance of the Nicene Creed.)

For this Synod of Nicaea is in truth a proscription of every heresy. It also upsets those who blaspheme the Holy Spirit, and call Him a

Creature. For the Fathers, after speaking of the faith in the Son, straightway added, 'And we believe in the Holy Ghost,' in order that by confessing perfectly and fully the faith in the Holy Trinity they might make known the exact form of the Faith of Christ, and the teaching of the Catholic Church. For it is made clear both among you and among all, and no Christian can have a doubtful mind on the point, that our faith is not in the Creature, but in one God, Father Almighty, maker of all things visible and invisible: and in one Lord Jesus Christ His Only-begotten Son, and in one Holy Ghost; one God. known in the holy and perfect Trinity, baptized into which, and in it united to the Deity, we believe that we have also inherited the kingdom of the heavens, in Christ Jesus our Lord, through whom to the Father be the glory and the power for ever and ever. Amen.



On the Catechism . . .

As we continue in the Pentecost season and its emphasis on growth in the Christian life and faith, our Catechism focus is on Confession and Absolution, for as Martin Luther wrote in the very first of his 95 theses, "When our Lord and Master

Jesus Christ said, 'Repent,' He willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance."

What sins should we confess?

Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even those we are not aware of, as we do it the Lord's Prayer; but before the pastor we should confess only those sins which we know and feel in our hearts.

Which are these?

Consider your place in life according to the Ten Commandments: Are you a father, mother, son, daughter, husband, wife, or worker? Have you been disobedient, unfaithful, or lazy? Have you been hot-tempered, rude, or quarrelsome? Have you hurt someone with your words or deeds? Have you stolen, been negligent, wasted anything, or done any harm?

Wherever a devout farmer or citizen or subject serves his master, he is also serving God. The same applies to a child, a servant, or a maidservant in the house, if they are obedient and faithfully do that which they should, likewise princes and masters, fathers and mothers, when they govern well and attend to their office. . . . Now, the whole world is full of such service, if only they [i.e., the persons just mentioned] would perform it, for everyone in his station has his work laid upon him by God, in which he not only should but can serve him daily and constantly. . . . Nobody can excuse himself by saying that he does not know how or wherewith he should serve God, or pursue other trumpery stuff and seek in his own way to serve God, a way which he has neither ordained nor commanded, and meantime neglect what he has been commanded to do, as we in our blindness have done hitherto.

Pentecost 8 (August 3):

Holy Gospel: Luke 12:13–21 (Parable of the Rich Fool.)

Office Hymn: LSB #782 "Gracious God, You Send Great Blessings"

Pentecost 9 (August 10):

Holy Gospel: Luke 12:22–34 (Don't Worry! Jesus has your back.) Office Hymn: LSB #666 "O Little Flock, Fear Not the Foe"

Pentecost 10 (August 17):

Holy Gospel: Luke 12:49–56 (Fire and Division . . . from Jesus?) Office Hymn: LSB #655 "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word"

St. Bartholomew, Apostle (August 24):

Holy Gospel: Luke 22:24–30 (Learning true greatness.) Office Hymn: LSB #583 "God Has Spoken By His Prophets"

Pentecost 12 (August 31)

Holy Gospel: Luke 14:1–14 (Parable of the Wedding Feast.) Office Hymn: LSB #842 "Son of God, Eternal Savior"

Pentecost 13 (September 7):

Holy Gospel: Luke 14:25–35 (Bearing the cross.) Office Hymn: LSB #731 "O God, Forsake Me Not"

Holy Cross Day (September 14):

Holy Gospel: John 12:20–33 (The cross as the glory of God.) Office Hymn: LSB #454 "Sing, My Tongue, the Glorious Battle"

St. Matthew, Apostle (September 21):

Holy Gospel: Matthew 9:9–13 (From taking to giving.) Office Hymn: LSB #730 "What Is the World to Me"

Saint Michael and All Angels (September 28)

Holy Gospel: Luke 10:17–20 (Satan falls; Jesus rises.)

Office Hymn: LSB #521 "Christ, the Lord of Hosts, Unshaken"

Note: The Liturgy through Holy Cross Day (September 14) is **Divine Service 4** (p. 203). The Liturgy beginning on St. Matthew, Apostle (September 21) is **Divine Service 2** (p. 167).
